## a) Headteachers report

The Headteacher (Brian Walton) gave a verbal update on the priorities of the new School Development Plan.

### • Attendance

Persistent absence was at 17.6% in 2021/22. The final national figures will not be available until March 2023.

5.7% of children were missing from education nationally between September and December 2021.

Brookside attendance finished at 93.5% for 2021/22. This was down to 3% on the previous year.

Persistent absence over the previous 3 years19-2020-2121-2214%9%17%

There were 45 children with persistent absence in 2021-22. The majority were for illness. Covid-19 accounted for 1465 sessions.

A Governor asked if there was a pattern in persistent absence from previous years? Yes – there are a lot of reason based on Covid-19.

Detailed letters have been sent to parents explaining the process for medical absences.

## • Curriculum Review

Nick Garrett has carried out a review of how topics link and has concluded that the school has a robust curriculum.

- EHCP's are at 4% in the school. They are only at 1.4% nationally
- There are a higher number os pupils with Speech and Language and Austism Spectrum Disorders in year 1, 3 and 4.
- Identification of children with Social, Emotional, Mental Health needs if Specialist Provision.

# b) Near Miss

The Headteacher (Brian Walton) reported that a specialist child had got out of the play area. They were then able to leave the school through the Nursery gate. This resulted in a near miss when they crossed the road unsupervised. They were then returned to the school by a parent.

The school has reviewed the CCTV which highlighted that a door had not been locked in the specialist play compound. The gate to the road is used throughout the day by parents to access the

Nursery and was not always shut properly.

An auto close mechanism has now been fitted to the nursery access gate and the compound gate is checked by staff regularly.

The Headteacher has met with the parents and agreed actions to be taken. This includes the child wearing a Hi-vis jacket when out in the playground.

A Governor asked how long it took to put the remedial actions into place? They were in place the next day.

Governors discussed the traffic calming measures in place outside of the school and noted recent visits by the police to enforce them.
