Dear Families,

Mrs Moore told me that we were at week 20 of the Academic year yesterday! That's over half way towards the end of the summer term. Where does the time go? We have been so busy and this term has been fantastic. The children have produced so much amazing work. I want to take this opportunity to thank Mrs Morris who puts the newsletter together. I was delighted reading through it. There is SO much to share and see.

I really like the Wellbeing section. January and February can be hard months. Christmas is over, money is tight and we set ourselves resolutions and healthy life styles that often clash with the short days and wet weather. This can be tough on our wellbeing and mental health. I think I never feel more tired than I do in January. What I do know is it is vital to talk about how we are feeling. It is also really important to listen to others. We have spent Children's Mental Health Week listening to children's views across the Academy. How do they feel in school? Who can they talk to? Do they feel bullied? Once we have all this vital data, we will be looking at it very closely and talking to children about it. How can we make Brookside a better place? Children often tell me that I just need to put a rollercoaster, zip wire or trampoline park in to make Brookside better. For some children, one bad day will make school feel a terrible place on that day - but the next could be the best day ever. We often find that how children feel is based on their wants and needs. We are a school and our purpose is education - but as you probably all know, education is better when we are happy. Once we have the children's results in we will share them with you.

I want to highlight a few amazing things in the newsletter:

Please read about the achievements of our girl's football team! What they have already achieved would make the Lionesses' and Sarina Wiegman feel so proud. They haven't finished yet either! Whatever they do next, they have been amazing and they have represented Brookside at the VERY highest level. We are incredibly proud.

I also want to point out the amazing work happening across the Academy through our Forest School, it's such a brilliant place to learn and the children have been find out about so much there.

Finally, I wish I didn't have to end on this (because I have written about it so many times) but once again PARKING is an issue that the Academy is being asked to deal with. I am quite sure that parents and carers would want us to be focusing on children rather than parking. We are pretty good at teaching and learning, as you can see in this newsletter. We are less skilled as police officers and traffic wardens. Driving a car is a huge responsibility and this responsibility is solely that of the driver. I can ask you very nicely to park safely. I could ask less nicely but ultimately what people decide to do outside the gates of the school is fully their responsibility. *But*, whenever people park badly, act inconsiderately, argue, say unkind things, speed, drive dangerously, park in front of our neighbours' drives or say nasty comments - these impact upon your children's school. They also make it less safe for everyone. It also takes time and focus away from the education of children at Brookside. This is often about having to park 5 or 10 minutes walk away from the Academy. I know that most people do this wonderfully and understand that Brookside cannot magic parking spaces out of thin air and we have to accept that we are a popular school and unfortunately, like schools everywhere, there will be lots of traffic at the start and the end of the day. Some patience, consideration, forward planning and an understanding that there is no magic wand solution will go a long way in ensuring we focus on your children rather than on your driving.

Thank you to all those people that go out of their way to think about others.

Wellbeing Matters

Welcome to the February edition of Wellbeing Matters! This time of year can feel a little gloomy with dark skies and cold weather but there are always good things to see if you look closely.

One of my favourite winter scenes is the incredible show put on by the starlings every evening (and morning if you're brave enough to be up at that time!) As dusk begins to settle, they put on a spectacular show which I never get tired of seeing.



We are now well past the winter solstice and so heading towards more and more daylight which always lifts the spirits. But, before we are too quick to chase away the night, take a moment to reflect on this: without darkness, we'd never see the stars.

The next time it's a clear sky and dark before bedtime, try and take a trip away from artificial light and look up. Our nearest star, Alpha Centauri, is over 4 light years away so when you look at it, you are seeing light that is 4 years old. The furthest star visible to the naked eye is Cassiopeiae which is an astonishing 16,300 light years away so if you look at it now, what you see was actually happening when Somerset was in the last Ice Age.





This week at school has been **Children's Mental Health Week** with the theme being **My Voice Matters**. Having a voice and being heard is something that empowers all of us and greatly increases our wellbeing. In the past, children were often overlooked with decisions made without considering their views. Happily, this position is now becoming less and less common. At Brookside, we recognise what an important role children have in their own lives and how we need to consult them and listen to them. Our School Council, chosen by the students to represent them, has been doing great work conducting pupil voice sessions throughout school and they will be putting their findings to Mr Walton in the new term.

Our first star is **Sophia** in **Early Years**.

Every morning, we have a 'Funky Fingers' workout using dough gym videos. At the end of the session, there is a playdough challenge which the children like to watch.

On Monday, Sophia brought in a pig pen that she had made at home over the weekend.


It is just wonderful to see Sophia engaging with her learning at home and wanting to share her creations with her friends at school.

What we've been up to recently

A very busy New Year in Nursery ...

Since returning after the Christmas break, all of our children settled straight back into Nursery, really quickly. We have welcomed some new children to our Baby room and Toddler room, who are settling in well.


As Chinese New Year starts on the 10th February, we have started carrying out some activities across the Nursery for this celebration. The children have been making dragons; lanterns and trying a variety of Chinese foods.


Our babies have also been exploring the Sensory room, based in the Toddler room. They have been going out for walks to explore the School environment, where they saw the pony and used the climbing equipment. We have lots of babies who are learning to walk, so they have been practising their walking and are doing really well. The babies made some bird feeders which are hanging in the baby garden, to which some of the children get really excited when they see the birds around.



In the Toddler room, the children have been going on walks to the park and around the local environment, looking at shapes, colours and numbers. The children have been exploring the School playground and carrying out large mark making using chalks. Some children made pizzas and biscuits to take home. The children have been exploring cultural dancing.

In the Pre-School room, the children have been learning about sharing and taking turns. We noticed that the children were sitting on the floor with their legs in the 'W' position, this isn't an ideal position for the children to sit in as it can cause problems with















Early Years—New Year's Resolutions, Minibeasts and Supertato!

We had a busy start to the term in Early Years. We learnt all about minibeasts and really enjoyed painting our favourite ones! The children also made homes for minibeasts from the junk modelling. In maths we practised writing our numbers up to 10 and enjoyed number songs and dances. The children got messy with flour play and had fun pouring in the water tray.



We then read The Very Hungry Caterpillar. The children had a go at making their own story maps and practised their cutting skills to order the food the Caterpillar ate on each day of the week. The children also enjoyed getting messy mark making in the shaving foam and trying out our new outdoor play equipment.

In Maths the children were learning how to use a Part Whole model for subtraction and addition. We also revisited capacity, using containers and water and weighing with the balancing scales.

For our skills afternoons In RE the children learned all about New Year's Resolutions and thought about something they would like to achieve, we wrote these down and have put them up in the classroom.

In Geography the children learned all about Minibeasts and their habitats The children did Art with Mrs Redman, using cotton reels and paints to create a Caterpillar print.

We also started at Forest School and the children had great fun, we spent some time learning the Forest School rules and then had some time to explore.



Early Years—continued ... The next book we read was 'What the Ladybird Heard'. The children enjoyed playing with the small world Farm and made Ladybirds from playdough using black pebbles to add spots. They practised their handwriting by writing what they could see in the story pictures.

In maths we learnt about odd and even numbers, subitising and introduced zero as a number.

In our skills afternoon we looked at maps discussing why and how we might use them (Geography), we enjoyed a music Lesson, the children discussed and compared old and new Teddy Bears (History) and we also learnt all about the importance of brushing our teeth and practised how we clean our teeth on some cuddly toys (PSED).



Last week, we enjoyed a 'Supertato' kind of week. We shared lots of different stories from the Supertato series. We made Supertato stick puppets to help us retell the funny stories. We made traps from junk modelling to catch the Evil Pea and created colourful 'wanted' posters to help others know who we were trying to catch. We made Supertato masks and painted/drew our own Supertato pictures. These have made a beautiful, colourful display in the classroom.



In Forest School, we engaged in a scavenger hunt, which was great fun. In our Knowledge and Skills lessons, we made fruit kebabs using our designs created the previous week. We used child-safe knives to cut and prepare the fruit. Eating them was definitely the best bit though!

In Maths we continued our learning of Number Bonds to 5. We used partitioning cards to help identify the bonds and then we tried writing the corresponding number sentences on a whiteboard.




Year 1—Numbers to 20, Faberge and Forest School

We have had a very busy time this term doing lots of fun and exciting work.

In English we have been using our wonderful imaginations to make up our own stories from a picture, this is very hard when you're only 5 and 6 and our teachers are incredibly proud of how well we have done. For one piece we even got to use grown up writing pens, this was the most exciting thing most of us have ever done at school! We are all trying very hard to keep our handwriting beautiful and neat by forming all our letters correctly and always sitting them on the line. If anyone would like extra handwriting sheets to continue this work at home please let us know and we can provide some.

In Maths we have moved our learning on to numbers to 20. We really need to know these numbers so we have talked about one more and one less than them, how to write them and how to represent them in tens and ones. An example of what this means is below.



We have been very busy in Art learning all about Faberge and the amazing eggs he produced. We are attempting to make two versions of our own, one from saltdough and one from paper mâché. Fingers crossed when we have finished you can see how hard we have worked on them.

We are lucky enough to have been chosen to take part in Forest School sessions this term with Keelie, although it is cold out there we are really enjoying our time. We have found mini beasts, engaged in some outdoor yoga, played games pretending to be birds searching for worms and much more. Thank you everyone who has provided the children with wellies on our Forest School day.



Year 2—Cricket, Beebots and Glockenspiels

We are thoroughly enjoying our sessions with Somerset Cricket! Last week we had to stay in the Marquee due to the weather but we had great fun balancing the bean bag on the bat and dribbling the ball between the cones. This week we could go outside so we were allowed to bat it as hard as we could! Next week, we a super excited as we get to play a game!

In Maths we have been focused upon equal groups, multiplying and dividing. We are becoming quick and more confident with our times tables day by day.

In English, we adored writing our fact files, all about...us! We learnt about titles, sub-headings and writing facts. Can you tell someone at home the difference between fiction and non-fiction.

We are loving learning about algorithms in computing and have even designed our own Beebot mats! We have also learnt about being safe on the internet and how to debug our algorithms!

Our teachers were so proud of us in Music, as we started to play the glockenspiels. We followed the board and played along with our partners brilliantly! We can't wait to have another go!

After half term, we embark upon our puppet topic. Please could you send in a wooden spoon for your child, complete with their name—that would be fantastic. If anyone happens to have any newspapers lying around, we will definitely be able to make good use of them. Thank you!



Year 3—Measurement, Magnets and GRRR!

In maths this term we are looked at measurement, starting with metres (M), centimetres (cm) and millimetres (mm). We have used a ruler to measure lines and also measured the heights of our partners with two metre sticks. It was great fun to find out who was the tallest and who was the shortest in the class.





In Science, we learnt about magnets. We have learnt that they have two poles, North and South! We know that a lot of everyday life objects use magnets. We investigated which two poles would attract or repel each other. We tested the strength of the different kinds of magnets we have in school using paperclips.

In English we have looked at a new text called GRRR! by Rob Biddulph and formulated some fantastic sentences starting with fronted adverbials. These are becoming second nature now and the children are doing it without thinking! We have also watched a film this week called 'Taking Flight' which the children loved and they wrote some superb diary entries as some of the characters. These photos are of us peer marking our friends work ensuring their writing had the features of a diary.




Year 4—Earnest Shackleton, Lily and the Snowman, and more ...

In Geography, we have been looking at different biomes around the world and what it is that makes them unique from one another. We have learnt that there are five major biomes (aquatic, grassland, forest, desert, and tundra), but that they can be subdivided further (tropical rainforest, temperate forest and taiga etc.)

In English, we have been watching the short story of Lily and the Snowman and we have been writing descriptively, including writing from different character's perspectives. We have written diary entries to explore the different emotions and feelings that Lily and the Snowman might have had throughout the time they spent together.

In Maths, we have been using place value charts to help us understand what happens to a number when we divide and multiply it by 10 and 100. We have also been continuing with our times table practise and have moved onto the 9 times table booklets.

Finally, in science, we have been learning about the different states of matter and how and why some materials are able to change from one state to another. We have looked at the differences between solids, liquids and gases and we have been planning investigations that we could carry out to explore changing states.




In English, we started learning about Sir Earnest Shackleton and his incredible ill-fated voyage to Antarctica. Sir Ernest Shackleton was an Anglo-Irish Antarctic explorer, who made three expeditions to the continent, most famously in 1914 on the Endurance.

The children have really enjoyed learning about how Sir Earnest Shackleton and his crew became stranded in Antarctica when their ship The Endurance became frozen in the pack ice. Using their incredible journey as an inspiration, the children have been writing letters to loved ones describing how their characters felt as they watched their ship get crushed by the ice.


We have also looked at how the crew of the Endurance were finally rescued after Shackleton and 5 of his men undertook a treacherous journey across land and sea to get help. What makes the story most remarkable is that none of the crew lost their lives and made it back to their homes.






Year 5- 'holes', by Louis Sachar

We have been continuing to read and analyse Holes by Louis Sachar and aim to have read it all by the end of this Spring term. This would mean that we can compare the book with the movie. It is always interesting to discuss why some features of the book were not included in the film, and if the characters were as they imagined they would be. Using the book for inspiration, we have been writing non-chronological reports about the elusive and deadly Yellow Spotted Lizard as well as writing descriptive and emotive letters from the campers of Camp Green Lake back to their parents. We have also discussed how racial prejudice affects some of the characters; Mr. Walton then came to speak to us about this very emotive issue, helping us to understand about equality and diversity.






Year 6—Electricity, Circuits and Shrek!

We have been investigating Electricity in science this term. We investigated the history of electricity using chronological skills. Working in groups, we created a timeline of key events to explore significant scientists and discoveries throughout the ages and the information we uncovered really surprised us. For example, we were really surprised to discover that appliances like washing machines were available to buy so soon after a World War, when resources must have been incredibly scarce! We then created our own Electric Circuits. Notoriously, the children love it and the teachers dread it: the classroom is ether full of tissue paper as we carry out an investigation to measure the brightness of a bulb; full of buzzer noise; or worse still, failing batteries and bulbs so that a circuit won't even work!

However, we overcame all the usual problem, as the children merrily counted the number of tissue papers needed to stop the brightness of a bulb, as we increased the number of wires into the circuit – and it worked! Hoorah!

They predicted, checked variables, conducted the investigation and worked collaboratively to do so, whilst problem solving along the way if one of the components failed.



We had an amazing time watching Crispin students perform Shrek at Strode College. We were amazed by the acting, singing and production. The children all loved the show and we would highly recommend watching it! A huge thank you to Crispin for inviting us to see their brilliant performance

Absence from School

Attendance at school is vital to your child's learning and development.

Children's progress will be affected if they are absent.

We have a statutory obligation to investigate any child's attendance that falls below 90% or below the 10 session absence threshold (10 or more half day absences within a 12-week period). Evidence of medical appointments, e.g. Doctor's/hospital/Dentist appointment cards/letters, etc., is required.

If your child is ill, please notify us before 8.45am via the **Studybugs** app, which is available to download from: studybugs.com.

Please inform the school beforehand if your child has to attend an appointment.

We are not able to authorise holidays in term time..

Children who arrive or leave school during the day **must** be signed in or out at the Academy office.

Free School Meals

Children who attend a Somerset Council school, whose parents or carers receive any of the following are entitled to free school meals:

- Income Support (IS)
- Employment and Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Universal Credit with an annual household income of less than £7400 after tax
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit, with an annual taxable income (as assessed by HMRC) of less than £16,190

Only the benefits listed above qualify for free school meals. If you have recently become unemployed, but are still receiving Working Tax Credits, you may be entitled to free school meals.

Non-Benefit related additional eligibility criteria:

Children of families who don't receive these benefits may also qualify for free school meals if the family's annual household income is no higher than the following:

- £22,700 for families outside of London with one child
- £26,300 for families outside of London with two or more children.

In addition to these thresholds, families must hold no more than £16,000 in capital and savings.

- And the parent or carer meets any of the following criteria:
- you are a Zambrano or Chen carer
- families who have no recourse to public funds with a right to remain in the UK on grounds of private and family life under Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights
- families receiving support under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989 who are also subject to a no recourse to public funds restriction
- a subset of failed asylum seekers supported under Section 4 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- you hold a British National (Overseas) BN(O) passport
- you are a spousal visa, work visa or student visa holder
- you have no immigration status.

Please phone the Entitlements Team, County Hall, on 0300 123 2224 for advice.

Children must be in school all day and they will be provided with a meal at lunchtime which is paid for by the school.

It is the responsibility of the parents or carers to register their entitlement and request free school meals for their children.

Children in nursery do not qualify for a free meal until they start school, but applications will be processed so that when your child starts school, you will already be notified whether they qualify for a free school meal or not

Uniform Reminder

The school uniform is very simple and reasonably priced. We expect the children to wear it: White or red shirt/blouse or polo shirt, Brookside sweatshirt or cardigan (a plain, low-cost, red sweatshirt or cardigan is

acceptable), grey or black skirt or trousers/shorts, red & white summer dress, black shoes. PE kit is red t-shirt and black shorts and warm joggers and trainers for the Winter. A warm, waterproof coat in wet/cold weather. Hair should be natural in colour and not of an extreme style (Mohicans, skinheads, or tramlines, are not acceptable). Every child should have a book bag and a PE bag. We give each new Early Years child a book bag before they start school. Sweatshirts, cardigans, PE kit and book bags can be ordered via the 'Uniform' link on the Academy Website.

ALL ITEMS SHOULD BE CLEARLY NAMED – PLEASE. Parents/carers will receive a text reminder if their child isn't wearing the correct uniform.

We have a convenient way for you to access, review and request changes to the data held on you and your children, as well as see key term dates and other information. You are able to access our new SIMS Parent app and website at your own convenience via smartphone, tablet or PC – anytime, anywhere.

What will you find in SIMS Parent:

- School term, inset dates and contact details available at the click of a button.
- Access to update your contact details, so we always have the most up-to-date information in case of emergency.
- Access to update Parental Consents for your child.
- Your child's attendance data.
- Your child's end of year report will be available here at the end of the Summer term 2024.

If you have more than one child at school, you'll have access to this information for all your children, from the same app. (Please note that this App is not available for our Nursery parents, as their children's records are held on a separate system; please contact the Academy Office if you would like to make changes to the personal information we hold for Nursery children.)

Step 3: Confirm your identity by entering the date of birth of one of your children at Brookside (in the format dd/mm/yyyy).

Step 4: At the 'Create a Strong Password' screen, create a password for the new account you are creating and click the Next button.

Step 5: Once your account has been created, you will receive an email at the email address you registered. Click the Verify My Email button.

Step 6: Click the Sign In button on the screen confirming your email address has been validated.

Head Lice Advice for Parents and Carers

Unfortunately, head lice are a common part of primary school life and schools no longer check children's hair. Anyone can get head lice and contrary to popular belief, having head lice is nothing to do with your personal hygiene.

Symptoms

Itching, although it is possible to have head lice without symptoms, so it is best to take a look.

How to check

Head lice are tiny and fast! Look behind ears, close to the scalp, at the back of the neck and under fringes. Adult head lice are 2 - 4mm long, immature lice are even smaller.

What are head lice

Head lice are live insects. Their empty eggs are called nits. Lice are wingless insects that hold on to the hair, feeding from the blood in the scalp. They spread through head-to-head contact, they do not jump. Adult females live for up to a month and lay around five eggs a day.

Our School procedure

If Lice are seen in a child's hair this advice letter will be sent home on that day to the whole class. If the Lice are a continuing issue for an individual child, then we will speak to the parent/carer directly.

How to get rid of head lice

Wet combing:

- 1. Wash hair using ordinary shampoo.
- 2. Lightly towel dry the hair.
- Apply a conditioner to make combing easier (this also makes it harder for the louse to cling on).
- Using a comb designed for this purpose part hair into small sections and comb hair from the scalp to the end.
- Wipe the comb each time and check for live lice.
- Repeat until you are sure the whole head is combed.
- Thoroughly rinse the hair and comb.
- Comb every three days for at least two weeks until no more lice are found.

Medicated treatments:

These are available from pharmacies - please follow the treatment's instruction leaflet.

Prevention

Check your child's hair weekly - don't wait for there to be symptoms. This is by far the best way to prevent head lice. Make it a weekly habit!

Please ensure that if your child has long hair it is tied back/up.

There are a number of head lice prevention products available i.e. Vosene shampoo for kids, tea tree sprays, etc.

Remember:

If you find head lice, check and treat the whole family at the same time.

Inform the school, baby-sitters, friends etc.

Lice only live on human heads they will not live on bedding or clothes.

They cannot jump or fly.

They are only caught by head to head contact.

Head lice are not fussy about the length of hair or how clean it is.
